Dear Executive Directors Levin and Greenberg:

The House Committee on Science, Space, and Technology (“the Committee”) writes to request that the Indivisible Project, a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization, provide certain documents relating to the organization’s activities, funding, and communications. The Committee is concerned about a growing body of evidence suggesting that foreign-funded organizations, including Chinese Communist Party (CCP)-affiliated non-governmental organizations (NGOs), may be shaping United States artificial intelligence (AI) and energy infrastructure policy.¹ This concern was reinforced on August 28, 2026, when X Corp.'s Global Government Affairs team disclosed that it had identified a network of approximately 200,000 suspected Chinese inauthentic accounts on its platform, a subset of which were found disseminating misleading claims that AI data centers are driving up household electricity prices in an apparent effort to manipulate the domestic policy debate over data center construction.²

Further, recent reporting indicates that foreign funding is also being directed toward organized campaigns opposing AI infrastructure outright—including efforts to halt data center construction—raising the possibility that foreign interests are working not merely to influence the direction of U.S. AI research, but to obstruct its development entirely.³

A report published in April 2026 by the American Energy Institute (AEI), titled “Foreign-Funded Opposition to U.S. Data Center Expansion,” found that twelve U.S.-based organizations actively opposing U.S. data center development have collectively received more than \$39 million from foreign donors, including individuals and foundations based in Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and Denmark.⁴ The report identified several foreign funding sources, including Hansjörg Wyss (channeled through the Wyss Foundation and Berger Action Fund), Chris Hohn, the Quadrature Climate Foundation, the KR Foundation, and the Oak Foundation.⁵ This is not a new phenomenon. A separate 2025 report by Americans for Public Trust similarly found that five foreign charities—the Quadrature Climate Foundation, the KR Foundation, the Oak Foundation, the Laudes Foundation, and Christopher Hohn's Children's Investment Fund Foundation—had directed nearly \$2 billion to a network of organizations engaged in U.S. energy and climate advocacy.⁶

The AEI report specifically identifies the Indivisible Project as an organization whose local chapters are actively hosting anti-data center events in multiple states, including Ohio, Virginia, Indiana, Georgia, and California, and notes that the national organization provides a distributed fundraising infrastructure that enables local chapters to organize without independent nonprofit status.⁷ The report also listed Indivisible Project as having received a combined \$7,455,000 from the Wyss Foundation.⁸ Given this documented activity and the organization's fundraising relationship with its local chapters, the Committee seeks to understand the extent to which foreign funding sources support Indivisible Project's operations and advocacy in this area, and whether such funding and any associated foreign coordination are properly disclosed under the Foreign Agents Registration Act (FARA).⁹

Pursuant to Rule X of the Rules of the House of Representatives, the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology has jurisdiction over matters relating to the development of energy and artificial intelligence policy, specifically “all energy research, development, and demonstration therefore, and all federally owned or operated nonmilitary energy laboratories”, the “commercial application of energy technology”, as well as “environmental research and development”, and “scientific research, development, and demonstration, and projects therefor.” Similarly, the committee is directed to “review and study on a continuing basis laws, programs, and Government activities relating to nonmilitary research and development.” Accordingly, the Committee requests that Indivisible Project provide the following documents, no later than September 24, 2026:

1. All documents and communications between any officer, employee, or agent of Indivisible Project and a foreign principal since 2023, where “foreign principal” includes:
 - a. a government of a foreign country and a foreign political party;
 - b. a person outside of the United States, unless it is established that such person is an individual and a citizen of and domiciled within the United States, or that such person is not an individual and is organized under or created by the laws of the United States or of any State or other place subject to the jurisdiction of the United States and has its principal place of business within the United States; and
 - c. a partnership, association, corporation, organization, or other combination of persons organized under the laws of or having its principal place of business in a foreign country.
2. A list of all foreign nationals, foreign entities, or foreign-based foundations that have donated, directly or indirectly (including through shell entities or donor-advised funds), more than \$5,000 to Indivisible Project from 2023 to the present, together with all documents concerning those grants or contributions.
3. All documents and communications since 2023 between any officer, employee, or agent of Indivisible Project and the Wyss Foundation, the Berger Action Fund, the Quadrature Climate Foundation, the KR Foundation, or the Oak Foundation.
4. All communications between Executive Directors Ezra Levin and Leah Greenberg and employees and board members, regarding international accounts referenced in section 4a of 350.org’s most recently published Form 990 filing.¹⁰

5. Any legal analysis, registration statement, or internal determination concerning Indivisible Project's obligations, if any, under the Foreign Agents Registration Act.
